## REPORT NUMBER 12 OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE ON ACADEMIC APPEALS

Mr. E.

Mr. E. a former Scarborough College student, appealed to be permitted to complete the requirements for a four-year degree. In the Fall of 1973 due to a variety of problems, including illness, Mr. E. lacked one and a half courses for the completion of these requirements. On petitions to the Committee on Standing of Scarborough College in August and September of 1973, he was granted permission to complete his fourth year by writing a supplemental examination in Statistics 222 and by registration in, and successful completion of a half course of his choice. His tutor in the statistics course agreed that the examination could be written whenever Mr. E. was ready to do so.

In the meantime, he received provisional acceptance into the graduate programme at York University and shortly after the commencement of this course, realised that he would not be able to undertake completion of his fourth year at the same time. He successfully completed his Masters programme in the Fall of 1974 and requested permission from the Committee on Standing of Scarborough College to make up the required one and a half courses. His request was refused.

After consideration of the documentary and oral evidence, the Subcommittee noted that no time limit had been specified by the Committee on Standing and that therefore a reasonable time limit should be imposed. It was felt that Mr.  $E_{\phi}$  had acted reasonably in the circumstances.

## YOUR COMMITTEE AGREED

THAT the appeal of Mr. E. against a decision of the Committee on Standing of Scarborough College be allowed and that he be permitted to write the next regular examination in Statistics 222 and to take a half course in the summer session of 1975. The mark obtained in the Statistics examination will be his mark for the course.

The meeting adjourned at 5:15 p.m.
