Dear Miss V.

At its hearing on October 1, 1981 the Trial Division of the University Tribunal considered the following charges against you:

- (1) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on Gulliver's Travels, which essay contained substantial portions of the ideas and expressions of ideas of another, contrary to s.E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;
- (2) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on Ode on a Grecian Urn, which essay contained substantial portions of the ideas and expressions of ideas of another, contrary to s.E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;
- (3) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on the Sound and the Fury and the Turn of the Screw, which essay contained substantial portions of the ideas and expressions of ideas of another, contrary to s.E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;
- (4) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on Gulliver's Travels, which essay was written either completely by, or with such substantial assistance of another person to be unauthorized assistance contrary to s.E.1(a)(i) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;
- (5) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on Ode on a Grecian Urn, which essay was written either completely by, or with such substantial assistance of another person to be unauthorized assistance contrary to s.E.1(a)(i) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;

- (6) that during the 1980/81 University term you did submit for credit in ENG 165Y an essay on the Sound and the Fury and the Turn of the Screw, which essay was written either completely by, or with such substantial assistance of another person to be unauthorized assistance contrary to s.E.1(a)(1) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour;
- (7) that in or about April 1981 you did submit an essay entitled "The Roman Army" for a course entitled Classics GRH 100Y in which essay you knowingly represented as that of your own, ideas and expressions of another, contrary to s.E.1(a)(1) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour. The following were the particulars:

The essay was taken substantially verbatim from a book entitled "Citizens of Rome" by Simon Goodenough.

I am writing to formally advise you of the decision of the Tribunal with respect to these charges. The jury found you to be guilty of charges #1-5 and #7 and acquitted you of charge #6. The jury imposed the following sanctions (and provided the following reasons for those sanctions):

- that you receive a grade of zero in ENG 165Y and in GRH 100Y ('in order that the integrity of the university will be protected and a degree of fairness will be shown to other students');
- that you be suspended from the University of Toronto for the 1981 winter session and the 1982 summer session. (The jury imposed a period of suspension because it felt that plagiarism was a major offence, that it should be recognized as such, and that in your case plagiarism was a recurrent problem.);
- that a notation of your academic misconduct be placed on your academic transcript for one year after the expiration of the suspension (in order that any similar 'problems' that may occur in the near future can be easily recognized).

I am forwarding to you and to the University Discipline Counsel information regarding rights of appeal. The deadline for you or for the University to file an appeal is October 27, 1981.
