Dear Dr. Strangway:

Re: Mr. T.

I am writing to advise you of the Tribunal's disposition of an alleged academic offence on the part of Mr. T., a third year University College student.

At its hearing on October 15, 1981, the Trial Division of the University Tribunal considered the following charge against Mr. T.

that on Wednesday, April 27, 1981 he did knowingly obtain unauthorized assistance in an academic examination contrary to s.E.1(a)(i) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters. The particulars of the charge were that during the examination in BCH 320Y, he did copy from the answer paper of Mrs. S. onto his own Mr. S's answers to questions on the examination.

Based on Mr. T.'s plea of guilty and the facts presented, the jury found Mr. T. to be guilty of the charge and imposed the following sanctions:

- failure in BCH 320Y
- notation of the reason for this sanction to be recorded on his academic transcript for one year, until April 30, 1982.

The jury gave the following reasons for its decision:

With respect to the first sanction, the jury stated that credit must not be given for work not performed by the

candidate. With respect to the second sanction, it was the jury's view that in spite of being cautioned by the invigilator, the accused continued to obtain unauthorized assistance. The jury felt that a harsher penalty did not seem appropriate in view of the student's plea of guilty and his apparent remorse.
