Dear Mr. M.

At its hearing on September 27, 1983 the Trial Division of the University Tribunal considered the following charges against you:

- (1) that on or about April 6, 1983, while a member of the University, you did knowingly represent as that of your own, the idea or expression of idea of another student in academic work submitted for credit in the course known as the laboratory component of CHE 207S, Organic Chemistry II, in that you did submit for credit a paper entitled "Experiment 26 Proteins", which paper was written by another student, contrary to Section E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour.
- (2) that on or about April 6, 1983, while a member of the University, you did knowingly represent as that of your own, the idea or expression of idea of another student in academic work submitted for credit in the course known as the laboratory component of CHE 207S, Organic Chemistry II, in that you did submit for credit a paper entitled "Experiment 32 Polymerization", which paper was written by another student, contrary to Section E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour.
- (3) that on or about March 30, 1983, while a member of the University, vou did knowingly represent as that of your own, the idea or expression of idea of another student in academic work submitted for credit in the course known as the laboratory component of CHE 207S, Organic Chemistry II, in that you did submit for credit a paper entitled "Experiment 25 Carbohydrates", which was substantially copies from a report written and already handed in by another student, contrary to Section E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour.

(4) that on or about April 6, 1983, you did falsify academic records of the University and did utter such falsified records in that you did, without the knowledge of Miss \$, obtain two of her reports, "Experiment 26 Proteins" and "Experiment 32 Polymerization", written and handed in in the laboratory component of the course. CHE 2078, Organic Chemistry II, obliterate her name and locker number and substitute your own name, and then hand in the two falsified reports, contrary to Section E.1(c) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour.

The Tribunal found you guilty of all the charges and imposed the following sanctions:

- · a mark of zero in the laboratory component of CHE 207S
- suspension from the University of Toronto for two years, from September 1983 to August 1985
- · a notation of these academic offences to be recorded on your transcript during the period of suspension.

The jury provided the following reasons for these sanctions:

'the jury believes that there must be an element of penalty in view not only of the offences themselves, but also because of their effect on another student.'

I am forwarding to you and to the University Discipline Counsel information regarding rights of appeal. The deadline for you or for the University to file an appeal is October 19, 1983.
