Dear Mr. C.

At its hearing on Tuesday, May 12th, 1992 the University Tribunal considered the following charges against you:

1. That you did use an unauthorized aid or obtain unauthorized assistance in a term test contrary to Section E.1.(a)(i) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters.

In particular, you made additions or alterations to your supplemental term test in ANT 100Y after the test had been marked and then you resubmitted the test with a request that it be remarked.

2. That in or about September 1990, you altered or falsified an academic record contrary to Section E.1.(c) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters.

In particular, you made additions or alterations to your supplemental term test in ANT 100Y after the test had been marked and then you resubmitted the test with a request that it be remarked.

3. That in or about September 1990, you made additions to your supplemental term test in ANT 100Y after the test had been marked with the intent to falsify or alter your academic record, being your course results for ANT 100Y, contrary to Section F.2. and E.1.(c) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters.

The jury found you guilty of the charges and imposed the following sanctions:

- a grade of zero in the course ANT 100Y; and
- a suspension from the University from May 13th, 1992 to September 1st, 1992.

The jury gave the following reasons for its decision: "We felt that no notation [on the student's academic record and transcript] was necessary since it would only last until September in any case. The zero on his permanent record is sufficient notation itself. The reason being we were trying to reach a balance between deterrence and the recognition of the seriousness of the offence, and the feeling that some clemency was in order in view of both the family circumstances and the very lengthy delay in bringing this forward. He almost had a two-year suspension someways already anyhow. To extend it into January might mean, in effect, another year's suspension. So we thought that this was a reasonable balance under the circumstances.

Information concerning rights of appeal may be found in Section L of the Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters. The deadline for filing an appeal by you or by the University is June 11th, 1992.
