TITLE OF ITEM OF BUSINESS: Constitutional Amendments: Ontario Institute for

Studies in Education

JURISDICTIONAL INFORMATION:

The Governing Council has the authority to establish faculty and college councils and to determine the composition, powers, and duties of those councils under the provisions of the *University of Toronto Act*, 1971, Section 2 (14)(i).

Section 5.2.2 of the Academic Board's terms of reference calls for amended divisional constitutions to be considered by the Board and confirmed by the Executive Committee. Amendments to By-laws are approved by divisional councils.

PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

On October 28, 2010, the Governing Council approved in principle the <u>Report of the Task Force</u> <u>on Governance</u> and the 32 recommendations outlined in the <u>Report</u>. Recommendation 15 provides for the re-distribution of and greater delegation of responsibilities. Specifically, the Task Force recommended that, as a guiding principle, transactional matters be delegated to either the lowest appropriate level within governance, or where appropriate, to the administration, with reporting back of decisions to a suitable level of governance.

An Implementation Committee, established by the Governing Council in October 2010 and led by then Vice-Chair Richard Nunn, was charged with overseeing and coordinating implementation of the Task Force's recommendations, ensuring appropriate participation among relevant bodies of governance, administrative offices and the Secretariat. The Implementation Committee's work on revisions to Board and Committee Terms of Reference led to Governing Council approval in May 2011 of the re-alignment of responsibilities among the Committee on Academic Policy and Programs, the Planning and Budget Committee, the Academic Board and the divisional councils with respect to academic program review and approval. These revisions were derived from two parallel processes – (1) that of the University's Quality Assurance

Process arising from the Council of Ontario Universities, and (2) the recommendations of the Task Force Report intended to vest academic decision-making and oversight with the institution's expert academic bodies.

In June, 2011, Principals and Deans were advised of the need for amendments to the constitutions of the academic divisions arising from changes to the approval processes for proposals for new academic programs and modification of existing programs. During the summer and early fall, 2011, representatives from the Office of the Governing Council and the Office of the Vice-President and Provost met with divisional representatives to discuss the required constitutional and related by-laws changes as well as the implications for divisional processes. Updated templates for divisional constitutions and by-laws were provided in order to enable greater consistency across the University, and divisional representatives were encouraged to draw freely from the templates when drafting revisions to their documents.

Amendments to the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE) Constitution were previously approved by the Academic Board on June 1, 2006 and confirmed by the Executive Committee of the Governing Council on June 15, 2006. In August, 2011, OISE representatives began to work with representatives of the Office of the Governing Council and the Office of the Vice-President and Provost on revisions to the OISE Constitution and By-Laws.

OISE's proposed constitutional revisions were presented to the Provost's Advisory Group on December 5, 2011 At the December 7 meeting of the OISE Faculty Council, notice was given that amendments to the Constitution would be forthcoming and the need for such changes were explained. At the February 15, 2012 Faculty Council meeting, the proposed amendments came before Council and as planned the motion was tabled after preliminary discussion to allow for community reaction to the amendments. The amendments fell into two main categories, those dealing with the devolution of authority under Quality Assurance, and those involving redefinition of Council Constituencies. This revealed strong concerns about the definition of Constituencies, and led to further work with representatives of the Office of the Governing Council and the Office of the Vice-President and Provost. Following this, notice of motion was again given to a February 13, 2013 Council meeting. Concerns about the Constituency definitions were again raised. The Amendments to the OISE Constitution were approved by the OISE Council on April 17, 2013, excluding those dealing with the definition of Constituencies.

HIGHLIGHTS:

All divisions were asked to incorporate into their constitutions provisions for the following powers and duties of Council.

• Academic Programs

 Council's responsibility for overseeing the content of academic programs and courses of study that lead to degrees, diplomas, certificates, credit and noncredit courses over which the Faculty has authority.

HIGHLIGHTS: (cont'd)

- Council's authority to recommend for approval to the appropriate body of Governing Council proposals for new academic programs.
- Council's delegated authority to approve proposals for major and minor modifications to existing academic programs. (Definitions of major modifications of existing programs, minor modifications, and new academic programs are provided in the *University of Toronto Quality Assurance Process* and are subject to change.)
- Council's delegated authority to approve proposals for the modification of existing diploma and certificate programs, pursuant to the University's *Policy on Diploma and Certificate Programs*.

• Delegation of Authority

Council's ability to delegate its authority for the approval of minor modifications to academic programs to various committees. All such changes must be reported for information to Council.

Review of Academic Programs and Units

Council's responsibility to consider and discuss a review report of an academic program and/or unit of the Faculty, consistent with the protocol outlined in the *University of Toronto Quality Assurance Process*.

• Transcript Notations

Council's delegated authority to approve transcript notations within existing degree programs, in accordance with University policy. An annual report on such actions, as required by policy, must be provided for information to the appropriate body of Governing Council.

Additional amendments to the OISE Council's constitution represent a re-organization and updating of the document in order to follow more closely the constitutional template provided by the Office of the Governing Council to all divisions. As well, the opportunity was taken to make simple housekeeping and editorial changes.

Other substantive amendments are as follows.

- Section VII Quorum

 The quorum was changed to one-third of the voting members of Council (from 20) to align with common practice across the University.
- Section VIII Chair/Vice-Chair The position of Vice-Chair was added.

An affirmative vote by two-thirds of the members of the Council present and voting is required to amend the Constitution is required by two-thirds of the members of the Council present. Following approval of the amendment by Council, the amendment is forwarded to Governing Council for approval.

XII-2 By-Laws The By-Laws of the Council may be amended at any regular meeting of the Council by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

V-1

Council recognizes that the Dean exercises powers under the authority of the 'Policy on Appointments of Academic Administrators' which states that 'the Dean of OISE is the chief executive officer of OISE and reports directly to the Vice-President and Provost.'

V-2

While the Dean may elect to delegate authority to other academic administrators in OISE, the Dean retains responsibility for the overall direction of OISE and in particular for authority over the budget, appointments and

VII.

Term and Ouorum of Council

VII-1

Terms of office of members of council and its Committees shall be from July 1 to June 30, with some Initial Teacher Education students beginning in the September session.

The quorum for a meeting of Council shall be one-third of the voting members. This number will be determined each year.

VIII.

Officers

VIII-1 Chair The Chair of the Council shall be elected by voting members from within the Council membership for a two-year term. The Chair shall be a non-voting member of Council.

Vice-Chair

The Vice-Chair of the Council shall be elected by voting members from within the Council membership for a two-year term.

VIII-2

The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Council. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall preside. In the absence of both the Chair and the Vice-Chair, any member of the Executive Committee may convene the meeting and a Chair shall be chosen by a majority of the voting members present for the meeting.

VIII-3 Secretary The Secretary of Council shall be appointed by the Dean, and will be the recording and corresponding officer of the Council. The secretary shall be a non-voting *ex officio* member of Council.

IX.

Meetings

IX-1

There shall normally be four regular meetings of Council in each academic year. Notice of each meeting, including a proposed agenda, shall be given to members at least two weeks in advance of the meeting.

IX-2 Special Meetings A special meeting may be called by the Chair of the Council, the Dean of OISE, or upon the written request of 10 members of the Council, and shall be convened within 10 days to consider the matter(s) requiring the meeting. Notice of such a meeting shall be given at least 1 week(s) prior to the meeting.

IX-3

Town Hall meeting

Council shall host at least one annual Town Hall meeting, normally chaired by the Dean or designate, to discuss issues of relevance to the OISE community. The Town Hall may recommend items arising to Faculty Council Executive for inclusion in the Council agenda at the next meeting.

IX-4
Voting

Each voting member of Council has one vote on any question. Motions pass with a simple majority unless otherwise stated in the rules of procedure of Council.

IX-5
Open meetings

Meetings of Council shall be open to the public except when matters of a confidential nature may be discussed. The Council will then move *in-camera*.

X.

By-Laws

X-1 Procedures The procedures of Council will be set forth in the By-Laws of Council.

X-2 *Committees*

The composition, powers, duties and procedures of Standing and Special Committees shall be set forth in the By-Laws of Council.

X-3 *B-Laws* The By-Laws of Council shall be approved by Council.

X1

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the most recent edition of Bourinot's Rules of Order shall govern the Council in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws and any special rules of order the Council may adopt.

XII

Amendment of the Constitution and By-Laws

XII-1 Constitution

The Constitution of the Council may only be amended with the approval of the Council and the Governing Council of the University of Toronto. Voting shall take place at a regularly constituted meeting of Council provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting. An affirmative vote by two-thirds of the members of the Council present and voting is required to amend the Constitution. Following approval of the amendment by Council, the amendment is forwarded to Governing Council for approval.

XII-2 *By-Laws* The By-Laws of the Council may be amended at any regular meeting of the Council by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

Constitution of OISE/UT Faculty Council

I. Authority from University of Toronto Act

The Council of OISE/UT exercises its powers and duties under the provisions of the University of Toronto Act, 1971, as amended.

II. Definitions

In this constitution and the accompanying by-laws:

- (a) "OISE/UT" or "the Faculty" means the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education of the University of Toronto.
- (b) "Faculty member" means a member of the teaching staff of OISE/UT at the rank of Professor, Associate Professor, Assistant Professor, Senior Lecturer or Lecturer, who holds a continuing academic appointment at OISE/UT of 50% or more.
- (c) "Librarian" means one who holds a continuing professional librarian appointment at OISE/UT of 50% or more.
- (d) "Instructor" means one who teaches 3 or more courses in the current academic year on a contract of less than 3 years duration or on secondment.
- (e) "Initial Teacher Education student" means any student registered in the consecutive Bachelor of Education and Diploma in Technological Studies program at OISE/UT or in Years 4 and 5 of the Concurrent Teacher Education Program.
- (f) "Graduate student" means any student registered with the School of Graduate Studies in an OISE/UT program of study leading to a Master's (including the Master of Teaching and MA-Child Studies), EdD or PhD degree.
- (g) "Staff" means any employee with an appointment of at least 50% who is employed at OISE/UT who is not a faculty member, librarian or a full-time student.





- (h) "Alumni" means graduates of post secondary degree or diploma in technological studies programs of OISE/UT and its antecedents who are not currently faculty members, staff or students.
- (i) "Council" means the Faculty Council of OISE/UT.

III. Council's General Powers and Responsibilities

- (a) Council shall determine its composition, including the number, composition and authority of committees of Council, subject to the provisions of the *University of Toronto Act 1971*, as amended, and with the approval of the Governing Council of the University, as required.
- (b) Council has authority for the academic policies of the Faculty, subject to the approval of such policies by Governing Council, as required. Academic policy sets out the principles for, the general directions of, and/or priorities for the teaching and research activities of the Faculty. Recommendations on divisional academic policy shall be referred to Council for discussion, advice and approval
- (c) Council may delegate authority to a committee of Council; however, decisions of committees of Council must be reported to Council.
- (d) Council plays an advisory role, tendering advice to the divisional administration, other bodies in the University, or bodies external to the University.

IV. Council's Specific Powers and Duties

The specific powers and duties of the Council are the following:

Determine its rules and regulations

(a) Council shall determine the rules and regulations for governing its procedures and its decisions shall be made by resolutions passed at its meetings.

By-Laws

(b) The Council shall pass by-laws regulating the exercise of its powers and the calling and conduct of its meetings, and the method of appointment or election of its members.

Establish committees

(c) Council shall have the power to establish, alter, or disband its committees as deemed necessary and to determine their composition, authority, quorum, and method of appointment of their members and chairs. Council has the final authority, be that in its decisionmaking capacity or in its advisory role, regarding recommendations brought forward by such committees.

Determine teaching programs

(d) Council shall determine the content and requirements of the teaching programs and courses of study that lead to degrees, diplomas, certificates and credits over which the Faculty has authority, and shall monitor the quality and standards of the programs.

Delegation of authority

(e) Subject to the provisions of the above, Council may delegate its authority over teaching programs and courses of study to various committees, to make minor changes without obtaining the approval of Council. All such changes shall be reported for information to Council. Major changes to any program require the approval of Council. The decision of whether a matter is major or minor may be made by the Dean in consultation with the Chair of the Faculty Council.

Awards

(f) Council shall award scholarships, bursaries, prizes and other awards in the gift of the Faculty and may delegate this responsibility to committees or officers of the Faculty.

Petitions and appeals

(g) Council shall establish policies and procedures as per University of Toronto policies and guidelines, with respect to petitions and appeals by students in connection with the application of academic rules and regulations by officers of the Faculty or by other teaching staff in connection with academic standing in the Faculty. The Committee shall make rulings on all such appeals and such rulings shall be final and binding, subject to an appeal to the Governing Council.

- (b) Voting members (except *ex-officio*) shall be elected by their own constituencies.
- (c) The Chair of the Council shall be elected by voting members from within its membership for a two-year term by the Council.
- (d) The Vice-Chair of the Council shall be elected by voting members from within its membership for a two-year term by the Council.
- (e) The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Council. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall preside.
- (f) The Secretary of Council shall be appointed by the Dean, and will be the recording and corresponding officer of the Council. The secretary shall be a non-voting *ex officio* member of Council.
- (a) There shall be a minimum of four meetings of Council in each academic year (July 1-June 30). A schedule of meetings shall be set at the commencement of the academic year. Additional meetings may be called by the Chair/Vice-Chair, or shall be called on request of ten members of the Council, on not less than three working days' notice. The purpose of such additional meetings must be stated in the notice.

VIII. Amendment

Voting shall take place at a regularly constituted meeting to which there has been 10 days' notice of the proposed amendment. An affirmative vote to amend the Constitution is required by two-thirds of the members of the Council present. Following approval of the amendment by Council, the amendment is forwarded to Governing Council for approval.

IX. Revised, Reviews

This Constitution was revised on April 26, 2006. It is subject to a review within 2 years.

X. Approved

This Constitution was approved by Faculty Council on April 26, 2006 and by Governing Council on June 15, 2006.
