Description of Proposed Changes:

1. VPMB01H3 is being added as a required course in component 2 of the Major Program in Music and Culture.

2. Reducing the electives by a half course so that the total credits to complete the program remain the same.

Rationale:

The change improves the alignment of the required courses with the three areas of study. Specifically, by making VPMB01H3 a required course, students will have a B-level introduction to the area of Community Music, which is comparable to the relationship of the other two areas to the required courses. The replacement of VPMB90H3 also contributes to balancing the required courses in light of the three areas of focus.

Impact:

There is no impact on new or continuing students because there is no change in the course offerings. Accordingly, the department will support both the old and new versions of the program.

Students complete a core of 6.0 credits in Arts Management courses, 1.5 credits in Management courses, 6.0 credits in one or more arts discipline (s), and 1.5 credits specific to either the Standard Stream or the Field Placement Stream.

Students must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average (CGPA), both overall and in Arts Managementspecific courses: 2.5 for the Standard Stream and 3.0 for the Field Placement Stream. Continuous consultation with the Program Director is strongly encouraged for all students in each year of their program.

At least 1.0 credit must be at the C- or D-level.]

Note: Because the completion of a Major program in a chosen artistic field is particularly valuable for students contemplating graduate studies and certain careers related to that subject, students may wish to add the Major Subject POSt and take additional arts courses to fulfil the Major requirement. Alternatively, one or more Minor program (s) may be valuable in certain fields of work and further studies.

The first year of study would normally consist of 5.0 credits (10 courses - five in each of the Fall and Winter semesters) including VPAA10H3, VPAA12H3, VPAA06H3, MGTA01H3, MGTA02H3, at least three courses from the "Arts Courses" section of the program requirements, and electives. ACMB01H3 can be taken as one of the "Arts Courses" in the Winter semester of the first year, or during second year. The second year of study would normally consist of 5.0 full credits (10 courses) including VPAB13H3, VPAB16H3 and VPAB17H3, ACMB01H3 (if not already taken, B-level courses from the "Arts Courses" program requirement, and electives. Arts Management students are encouraged to consider ACMB02H3 as one of their elective choices.

Description of Proposed Changes:

VPAB07H3 is being replaced by ACMB10H3 in program requirement # 1.

Rationale:

The change is made to the program to ensure consistency with course changes and program changes in the Calendar.

This change will have no impact on new students. Continuing students will take ACMB10H3 in place of VPAB07H3.

The second half of the course introduces inferential statistical bivariate and multivariate methods. These topics include significance test for a mean (t-test), significance emphasizing contingency table analysis and Chi-square test for a proportion, comparing two groups (e.g. regression, comparing two proportions, comparing two means), associations between categorical variables (e.g., Chi-square test and analysis of independence), and simple linear regression variance.

Co-op Work Term Requirements

Students must satisfactorily complete two Co-op work terms, each of four-months duration. To be eligible for their first work term, students must be enrolled in the Major (Co-op) Program in English and have completed at least 9.0 credits, including ENGA01H3 ENGB03H3, ENGB04H3, and ENGA02H3 ENGB05H3.

In addition to their academic program requirements, Co-op students complete up to four Co-op specific courses. These courses are designed to prepare students for their job search and work term experience, and to maximize the benefits of their Co-op work terms. They cover a variety of topics intended to assist students in developing the skills and tools required to secure work terms that are appropriate to their program of study, and to perform professionally in the workplace. These courses must be completed in sequence, and are taken in addition to a full course load. They are recorded on transcripts as credit/no credit (CR/NCR) and are considered to be additive credit to the 20.0 required degree credits. No additional course fee is assessed as registration is included in the Co-op Program fee.

Students must complete the program requirements as described in the Specialist Program in English.

Co-op Work Term Requirements

Students must satisfactorily complete two Co-op work terms, each of four-months duration. To be eligible for their first work term, students must be enrolled in the Specialist (Co-op) Program in English and have completed at least 9.0 credits, including ENGA01H3 ENGB03H3, ENGB04H3, and ENGA02H3 ENGB05H3.

In addition to their academic program requirements, Co-op students complete up to four Co-op specific courses. These courses are designed to prepare students for their job search and work term experience, and to maximize the benefits of their Co-op work terms. They cover a variety of topics intended to assist students in developing the skills and tools required to secure work terms that are appropriate to their program of study, and to perform professionally in the workplace. These courses must be completed in sequence, and are taken in addition to a full course load. They are recorded on transcripts as credit/no credit (CR/NCR) and are considered to be additive credit to the 20.0 required degree credits. No additional course fee is assessed as registration is included in the Co-op Program fee.

Most SLP graduate programs require students to have undertaken courses in Physiology; we consulted with Biological Sciences who designed BIOB35H3 to meet this need; BIOA11H3 is the prerequisite for BIOB35H3. LINB19H3 is a new course that was proposed for the 2017/18 year that was never assigned to a bin as an option, so we are adding it now.

4. The added note directs students interested in Speech Language Pathology as to the best courses to take.

LGGC64H3: Reading Chinese: China from the Inside Out

Description:

Track Changes: Intended for students who are able to read Chinese and English well everyday publications, e.g., newspapers in either complex form characters or simple form characters. Complex-simplified Pinyin, complex-simplified character conversion and vice versa, as well as English-Chinese and Chinese-English bilingual texts fluency are emphasized through reading, discussion, and translation discussing advanced materials in a variety of topics from, and outside of, Greater China, presentations, translation comparison, translation, and essay writing.

Description of Proposed Changes:

1. CSCA20H3 has been added as a required course to the First Year components of the program requirements - students may substitute CSCA08H3 for CSCA20H3; CSCB58H3 has been removed from the Second or Third Year component of the program requirements; the total credits in CSC courses and for the program remain unchanged.

Rationale:

The changes will ensure students gain a minimum level of programming skills, which are necessary in the modern Physical Sciences.

The change will also facilitate and complement the newly introduced and the planned intermediate and higher UG level courses on algorithms and methods of computational Physics and Astrophysics. For example, the higher level numerically-oriented courses such as PSCB57 presuppose basic programming skills. Meanwhile such introductory programming skills have not so far been taught or required. This puts the delivery of our higher-level courses in jeopardy. Of necessity they become preoccupied with basic programming, as opposed to computational science, and fall short of the goal of teaching a broad range of algorithms and computing methods. The proposed change solves this problem. It also enables the 4th year individual reading or research courses to have more substantial ties to practical numerical analysis.

Impact:

o Students who are choosing the program as a subject POSt for the first time.

The total credit requirement of the program is unchanged. Students will get exposed to programming at an earlier time (recommended: 1st year), and instead of CSCB58, tied more to hardware than software skills, will take a practical course CSCA20 on introductory programming (or a more theoretical CSCA08, in special cases where that course is a prerequisite for intended higher level Computer Science department courses not required in this program.)

We foresee a very minor increase of enrolment in a large multi-section courses more than by a small number of up to 5 students. We consider this a minor change and thus did not conduct consultations with the Computer Science curricular committee.

EESD20H3: Urban Environmental Problems of the Greater Toronto Area

Title:

Urban Environmental Problems of the Greater Toronto Area

Geological Evolution and Environmental History of North America

Abbreviated Title: Urban Env Problems of Toronto

Description:

Track Changes:The world is increasingly urban and cities are the focus of many acute environmental problems e.g., disposal of solid and liquid wastes, and contamination of soil, air and water. These issues will be reviewed for the GTA with reference to various field and geophysical methods used to explore contaminated sites, environmental audits, government legislation and guidelines issued by regulatory agencies, and site cleanup. This course teaches essential applied skills to students in Environmental Science.

This course reviews the geological and environmental evolution of the North American continent over the past 4 billion years by exploring the range of plate tectonics involved in continental growth and how those processes continue today. It will explore major changes in terrestrial and marine environments through geologic time and associated organisms and natural resources of economic importance, and will conclude with an examination of recent human anthropogenic influences on our environment especially in regard to urban areas and associated problems of waste management, resource extraction, geological hazards, and the impacts of urbanization on watersheds and water resources. The course will include a weekend field trip to examine the geology and urban environmental problems of The Greater Toronto Area. It provides students in environmental science with a fundamental knowledge of the importance of environmental change on various timescales and the various field methods used to assess such changes.

Rationale:

The course has evolved over time and the revised course title and description better fit its content. The proposed course title and content will bring the course name and content into line with the requirements of the Association of Professional Geoscientists of Ontario with whom our Environmental Geoscientists have to register to be able to gain profession employment in Canada.
