1. Chair's Remarks

The Chair welcomed members and guests to the final meeting of the 2016-2107 governance year. He introduced the members who participated in the meeting by teleconference.

The Chair invited Mr. Larry Whatmore, Chair of the UTSC Campus Affairs Committee (CAC) and Professor Elaine Khoo, Chair of the UTSC Academic Affairs Committee (AAC) to share highlights on the Committee's work during this past governance year. Mr. Whatmore reported that the CAC had recommended to Campus Council the Extra-Departmental Unit B (EDU:B) Interdisciplinary Centre for Health and Society (ICHS) and the Capital Project: Report of the Project Planning Committee for a New Student Residence at the UTSC. Professor Khoo reported that the AAC had approved several new programs which included: Minor in Natural Sciences and Environmental Management, a new Freestanding Minor in Health Humanities and the addition of a stream in Journalism to the major in Media Studies. She also reported that the final meeting for the AAC would be held on June 14th.

The Chair also reflected on what the Council had accomplished together, and thanked the members for their participation. He also thanked the Vice-Chair, Assessors, and the Secretariat staff for their commitment to the work of the Council over the past year.

He congratulated Ms Kathy Fellowes, Acting Director of Governance, on receiving the Patrick Phillips Staff Service Award at the Celebration of Distinguished Service earlier that day.

He concluded his remarks by advising members that they would receive an online end of year Council evaluation survey. He encouraged members to complete the survey and share their feedback.

2. Report of the Vice-President and Principal

The Chair invited Professor Bruce Kidd, Vice-President and Principal to introduce the student presentation.

a. Student Presentation – ARTSIDEOUT

Ms Kali Banner, Artistic Director, ARTSIDEOUT and Ms Laura Enriquez, General Manager, ARTSIDEOUT explained that ARTSIDEOUT was a one-day event led by student volunteers to celebrate arts and culture in physical and conceptual spaces at UTSC. Their presentation included an overview of their mission and the events planned to celebrate their 10th anniversary, which was themed: "Collected Stories". The event would take place on October 5, 2017. To conclude, they solicited ideas from Council members for future ARTSIDEOUT events.

A member asked whether there was interest in creating a Nuit Blanche in the eastern Greater Toronto Area together with UTSC as a key contributor and participant. Ms Banner indicated that conversations and discussions had taken place with the organizers of Nuit Blanche.

A member suggested that community partnerships, perhaps with the City, could lead to UTSC art exhibits on display throughout the local community in various spots.

b. Principal's Report

Professor Kidd updated the Council on the construction progress of the Highland Hall project, and that the new Student Residence project was in the final stages of governance approval.

Professor Kidd reported that the campus continued to face challenges related to transportation and student aid, but was eager to lobby the government and donors for support.

Professor Kidd commented on the rise of intolerance for those considered to be 'others' in our global community. He reinforced that assistance and supports would be available to all members of the UTSC community.

Professor Kidd reported that UTSC would host the North American Indigenous Games (NAIG) Day event on May 29th. The event would showcase the celebration of Indigenous Culture and Sport and promote the Games, which UTSC would be a host of in July.

Professor Kidd concluded his report by congratulating the Chair, Professor Paul Kingston, for his service to UTSC for the past twenty-five years. He remarked that the June 19th Convocation ceremonies provided an opportunity to honour the 2017 graduating class, and announced that Dr. Catherine Bragg would deliver one of the three UTSC convocation addresses.

3. Annual Report: Vice-Principal, Research - UTSC

The Chair welcomed Professor Heinz-Bernhard (Bernie) Kraatz, Vice-Principal Research to deliver the annual report. His presentation¹ included the following highlights:

- UTSC Faculty had received numerous prestigious awards and honours over this past year: including those from the Royal Society of Canada, and within the UTSC community such as the UTSC Principal Research Awards;
- In 2015 and 2016, UTSC published over 700 scholarly journal articles, books and book chapters;
- Faculty at UTSC continued to collaborate internationally with researchers from Carnegie Mellon University, Imperial College London, University of Michigan, and University of Oxford;
- In 2016-17, 239 faculty members were recipients of Tri- Council funding (i.e. NSERC-Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council, SSHRC- Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, and CIHR- Canadian Institute for Health Research) in the amount of approximately \$11.4M, or an 86 percent success rate;
- Professor Kraatz commended the work of the VPRO team and noted in particular the work of the Vivarium team. He focused on the mission of this Office which enhanced and promoted research activities at UTSC through administrative support, seed funding, student research support and funding for research related activities;

- Over the past four years the Office of the Vice-Principal, Research had been involved in the administrative oversight of 687 external grant applications and provided enhanced support to approximately 317 applications;
- The Research Advisory Board served as a channel for information dissemination on matters related to research to and from departments, as well as an advisory group to the Vice-Principal, Research. The Board was also responsible for the evaluation of nominees/applicants for internal research awards and funds that would allow for research to be taken to the next level on the external scale making it more competitive;
- A new VPRO funding initiatives provided two working groups with \$3000 each, and an International Research Collaboration Fund sponsored 14 initiatives at \$2500 each for a total of \$35,000;
- VPRO Funded Research Events in 2016-17 included the New Frontiers Seminar Series, Science Rendezvous, and Undergraduate Research Poster Forum;
- The Hub, a dedicated space at UTSC, encouraged students and graduates to explore their entrepreneurial spirit. In 2016-17, 926 students participated in Hub events with over 20 companies formed (e.g. Genecis, StageKeep, Volykos and Rouge National UrbanPark).

A member asked what selection criteria was used for deciding who The Hub would work with. Professor Kraatz commented that we need to distinguish between Undergraduate student, Graduate students and faculty. Undergraduates retain intellectual property; faculty and researchers have intellectual property agreements with UofT. UofT only retains Intellectual Property with faculty.

In response to a question from a member regarding intellectual property, Professor Kraatz explained that faculty members were bounded by the University's intellectual property policy, while undergraduate and graduate students retained their own intellectual property.

A member commented on the composition of the Research Advisory Board, which was filled by faculty members and suggested that external members have seats on the Board. Professor Kraatz welcomed the suggestion to have external members serve on the Board to offer expert advice was an industry perspective.

4. Strategic Topic: The Changing Landscape of University Tuition in Ontario

The Chair invited Ms Fiorella Shields, Associate Registrar and Director of Student Services and Ms Lisa Lammana, Manager Scholarships & Awards to present information on university tuition and student financial aid in Ontario. The presentation² included the following highlights:

• Financial matters were an important factor in determining whether students pursued education. It was not uncommon for students to have ongoing family and personal issues that impacted and/or limited their access to financial assistance;

- Students' expenses were approximately \$12,800 (living at home) and \$20,510 (living away from home);
- The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) eligibility criteria and the two types of funds available were described. Grants and Bursaries were non-repayable aid and loans were repayable aid. Students had the option to choose to accept only the grant portion of available funding;
- University of Toronto Advance Planning for Student (UTAPS) was a grant that toped up OSAP for those students who have unmet financial needs;
- OSAP was available to students studying outside of Canada;
- In September 2017, changes were being made to OSAP to provide free tuition (i.e. average cost of an Arts and Science degree program) for students with a family income less than \$50,000. In addition, students were able to earn up to \$11,200 during the 8 month study period without their OSAP being impacted, and the Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) income would no longer have to be disclosed nor would federal income received by Indigenous students under the Post-Secondary Student Support program. Lastly, recent graduates would be able to earn at least \$35,000 per annum before having to re-pay their Provincial portion of their OSAP loan;
- 660 students received entrance scholarships in the Fall 2016 for a total of \$1,050,000 and 70 students received a \$3,000 entrance scholarship that was renewable. The funds for the scholarships were made available by the Dean's Office and Donors of UTSC;
- In the Fall of 2017, a new entrance scholarship of \$500 would be awarded to students accepted to a program in the Humanities, Social Sciences, and Environmental Sciences with an average of 85 to 87.9 percent;
- The Lester B. Pearson International Scholarships provided financial support to outstanding international students who were pursuing undergraduate degrees. This year, thirty-seven scholarships were awarded. Four students would be attending UTSC in various co-op programs. It was expected that by 2021, there would be 150 full-time Pearson Scholars; and
- In-course awards, departmental, and the top graduating awards (i.e. Governor General's Silver Medal, John Black Aird and The Rose Sheinin) were described.


What is OSAP?

- The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP), which is offered by the Government of Ontario, provides financial assistance to students to help them attend college or university.
- OSAP is based on financial need, not grades.
- With one application, students will be considered for non repayable grants, as well as an OSAP loan.











Funding Support Amounts

The amount of OSAP aid a student will qualify for is based on the calculated financial need.

Free Tuition

Starting in September 2017, the changes to OSAP will result in **free average tuition and no provincial debt** for:

- **Dependent students** whose annual family income is less than \$50,000.
- Independent students whose annual income is less than \$30,000.









Free Tuition - Eligibility

Free tuition means OSAP grants would equal or exceed:

- Actual tuition for an undergraduate regulated Arts and Science program at an Ontario university; or
- **Equivalent** of regulated Arts and Science tuition for students in deregulated higher tuition programs such as engineering, computer science and management.


