7. Rationale:

We have put major effort into redefining our graduate curriculum to respond effectively to the recent changes and developments in the field of German Literature, and especially to the emergence of German Studies as a new field of interdisciplinary endeavour that increasingly redefines, broadens, and intensifies debates central to all fields of literary and theoretical study. In this context our curriculum is designed to prepare students for critical and independent scholarship in modern German Studies from the 18th century to the present. Moving along paths similar to those taken in the graduate programs of our peer institutions in North America, we feel that concentration on the modern period will allow us to adjust our curriculum effectively and accommodate the exigencies of a rapidly changing field (as well as one that is increasingly under fire).

After due consideration we have decided no longer to differentiate among what are normally called fields within our graduate program. Our new concentration on the modern period, the eclectic courses we now offer (which rotate regularly in and out of the graduate timetable), the cross- or interdisciplinary nature of so many of our courses, the ability of our faculty to win grants that take them away from Toronto during periods of research, and our diminished numbers – these pedagogical, disciplinary, and staffing issues, together with what the last report indicated was a difficulty in defining our focus in an appropriate way, have convinced us that there would be no real dividend if we carved our program into discrete fields or sub-fields. The chronological scope that we still demand as part of the Reading List requirement for our Qualifying Exams, in our opinion, suffices to ensure that students in our program acquire a fruitful balance of focus and breadth. Reflecting this new state of things, we henceforth intend to advertise our program as a "Graduate Program in German Literature, Culture, and Theory."
