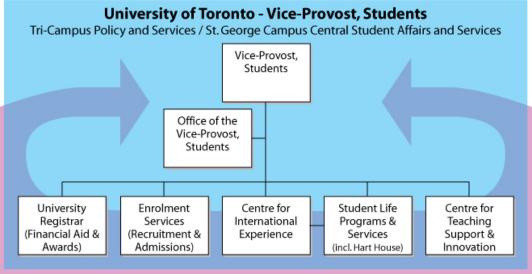

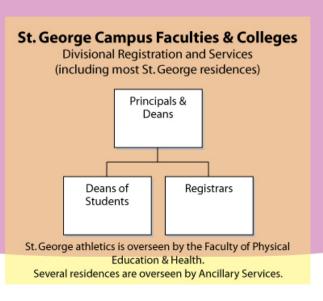

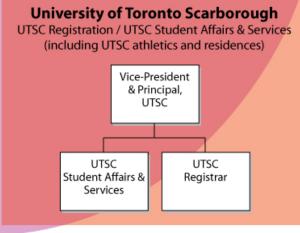

- 5. Educational effectiveness is related to level of student involvement



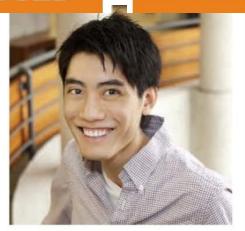

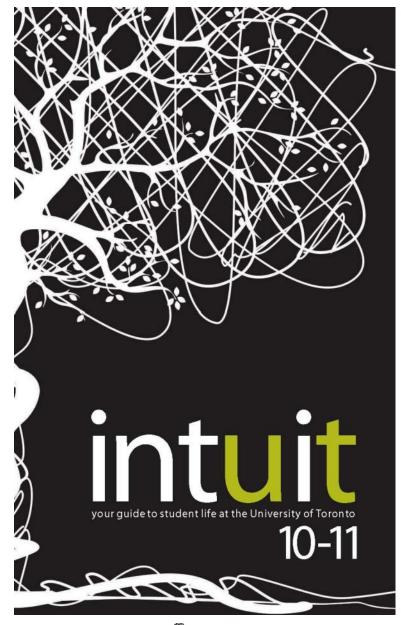

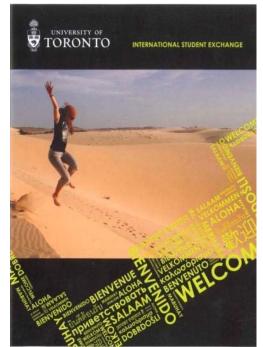
