1. Chair's Remarks

The Chair welcomed members and guests to the final meeting of the Committee for the governance year.

The Chair offered reflections on the work of the Committee and noted the significant level of activity. In addition to the annual items, presented for information, the Committee approved a number of minor and major modifications to courses and programs at UTSC. The Committee also approved a Category 2 Certificate in Biological Sciences Research Excellence and received details on the External Reviews from the Departments of: Arts, Culture and Media; Historical and Cultural Studies; Physical and Environmental Sciences; and Psychology. Finally, robust Assessor Reports were shared with the Committee on a number of Decanal matters, and the Committee also received information on pathway agreements and the changes to OSAP in the form of strategic topics. In closing, the Chair congratulated the Committee on the work they accomplished together, and remarked that she looked forward to continuing to Chair the Committee again during the 2019-20 governance year.

2. Category 2 Certificate: Certificate in Global Development, Environment and Health (U of T Global Scholar)

Mark Schmuckler, Vice-Dean, Undergraduate, reported that the Centre for Critical Development Studies (CCDS) was proposing a Category 2 certificate in Global Development, Environment, and Health. Professor Schmuckler commented that the proposal was in in alignment with the University's Global U Initiative, a tri-campus initiative, which focused on developing globally minded students across disciplines to encourage a global perspective and competence. He articulated that the certificate was opened to all UTSC students in degree programs and consisted of 2.0 credits. Of the 2.0 credits, 1.5 would be earned from existing UTSC course offerings and 0.5 earned through the completion of a new course (Global Development in Comparative Perspective). Professor Schmuckler commented that the certificate was for-credit and offered in conjunction with an undergraduate program. Upon completion of the certificate, a notation would be included on students' transcripts. Finally, Professor Schmuckler thanked the Director of the Centre for Critical Development Studies, Paul Kingston, and the Chairs of the Departments of Political Science and Sociology Grace Skogstad and Patricia Landolt, for their commitment in developing the certificate.

THAT the proposal to introduce a new (Category 2) Certificate in Global Development, Environment and Health (U of T Global Scholar), as described in the proposal dated May 13, 2019 and recommended by the Vice-Principal Academic and Dean, William Gough, be approved effective as of Fall 2019 for the 2019-20 academic year.

3. External Review, Centre for French and Linguistics (CFL)

William Gough, Vice-Principal, Academic and Dean, reported that the external review for the Centre for French and Linguistics was completed in May 2018 and was reviewed, for information, by the Committee on Academic Policy and Programs (AP&P) and Academic Board in April 2019. Professor Gough reported that the review was the first review for the Centre as an independent unit since the Department of Humanities first began departmentalization in 2010. Overall, he reported that the review was positive. The reviewers commented on the strong enrolment for programs in French, Linguistics, Psycholinguistics, and English/Chinese Translation. However, the reviewers noted that there were specific enrolment challenges for the Specialist in French as a result of the closure of the Concurrent Teacher Education Program (CTEP) and its replacement with the Combined Degree Programs, which required students to earn a higher cumulative grade point average (CGPA). The reviewers highlighted the work of the Linguistics Students Association (LSA) who were actively involved with local Scarborough high schools bringing awareness to the field of French and Linguistics. Professor Gough remarked that the reviewers were impressed with the work of research faculty in the Centre whose students were consistently winning research awards. Finally, he commented that the Centre was exploring the possibility of offering graduate programing and a Bachelor of Science in Psycholinguistics. The Centre would be augmenting its staff compliment to meet the academic demands. Professor Gough thanked the Interim Director of the Centre, Sandra Bamford, for leading and guiding the Centre so diligently.

A member asked what the differences were between linguists and psycholinguistics. Professor Bamford briefly explained that linguistics, in general, was the study of language, including morphology, syntax, phonetics, and semantics. Psycholinguistics was the study of mental aspects of language and speech.

A member commented on the closure of CTEP for French specialist programs and the impact on faculty teaching loads. Professor Gough remarked that the closure of CETEP impacted French faculty because fewer sections of courses were offered, which was also reflected in a reduction of sessional lecturers.

4. Reports of the Presidential Assessors

Professor Gough reported, for information, that two Facilitated Transfer Agreements were being finalized with Centennial College and Loyalist College to provide new pathways for College students to enter University. In summary, upon the completion of two years of study in college, and coupled with a defined cumulative grade point average (CGPA), applicants would be admitted to a UTSC degree program. He remarked that the Agreements with Centennial College

and Loyalist College would be signed shortly. In addition, facilitated transfer pathways were being developed for programs in Biotechnology at Centennial College and Loyalist College.
