Provost's Annual Report on Cases of Academic Discipline 2018-19

On behalf of teacher and student and in fulfillment of its own principles and ideals, the University has a responsibility to ensure that academic achievement is not obscured or undermined by cheating or misrepresentation, that the evaluative process meets the highest standards of fairness and honesty, and that malevolent or even mischievous disruption is not allowed to threaten the educational process. These are areas in which teacher and student necessarily share a common interest as well as common responsibilities.

These words from the University's *Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters* (the "*Code*") aptly capture the vital importance of academic integrity to the University's academic mission.

The University's academic integrity strategy is led institutionally by the tri-campus Provostial Advisory Group on Academic Integrity. Responsibility for academic integrity, however, is shared with the divisions. Dean's Offices, dedicated offices within the larger divisions, and faculty and instructors all work together to ensure that students meet clear expectations around academic integrity. The Centre for Teaching Support and Innovation has also played a significant role in educating instructors on assignment and syllabus structures that ensure students respect these expectations.

Professional development workshops for faculty and staff engaged in academic integrity processes are also held biannually, with approximately 50 individuals typically attending. The workshops include advice on meeting a division's obligations under the *Code*, as well as tips and best practices on meeting with students whose actions are being considered as an offence under the *Code*.

Divisional campaigns to build awareness of academic integrity have been enhanced by a centrallyorganized campaign alerting students to academic integrity scenarios that reappear frequently in cases at the University Tribunal. This campaign has seen posters highlighting these common scenarios displayed across the three campuses in print and screen formats.

The *Code* establishes two sets of procedures for addressing offences committed under the *Code*: one process for cases that are able to be managed entirely within the divisions, and one for those that proceed to the University Tribunal. Cases proceed to the Tribunal based on the seriousness of the type of offence, the weight of an assignment in which an offence has been committed, or the fact that the student has not admitted to the behavior being charged. The Provost's Annual Report on Cases of Academic Discipline contains two distinct Appendices that reflect these two processes, with **Appendix A** outlining statistics and trends pertaining to cases which are overseen completely by the divisions, and **Appendix B** detailing statistics and timeliness of cases brought before the University Tribunal.

The reporting of these statistics enables the Provost's Office and Dean's Offices to assess statistical trends pertaining to academic misconduct across the University. In a welcome trend, this past

academic year saw reductions in a) the total number of students and the percentage of our students who had cases dealt with by a division, b) the number of students facing new charges who had previously committed an offence under the *Code*, and c) the overall number of *Code* offences that were dealt with by the divisions. The number of new cases before the Tribunal has also not returned to the 2016-17 level, a previous high.

This report is provided for information, and will be a resource for discussion with the divisions by the Provost's Office.

There was one case where the process took longer than 15 months, due to multiple appeals and adjournment requests by the student.
