PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

The annual report was provided for information to the Campus Affairs Committee and the University Affairs Board on April 29, 2020 and May 21, 2020, respectively.

HIGHLIGHTS:

An organization seeking campus or university recognition must submit an annual application and constitution to the UTM Centre for Student Engagement. As of April 4, 2021, for the 2020-2021 academic year there were 120 groups recognized (76 renewing, 44 new); none were refused. In addition, UTM recognizes 17 academic societies associated with academic departments, and 10 affiliated organizations that offer services to students who subsidize them (such as student governments and student-run media, whose membership is automatic based on students' registration.)

Subject: Report on UTM Recognized Student Groups 2020-2021

The size and diversity of the student community at the University of Toronto Mississauga campus provides an extraordinary number of opportunities for students to participate in a vast array of activities undertaken by student groups. Participation in these groups forms an integral part of the student experience. Student groups contribute in a variety of ways to the educational, intellectual, recreational, social, and cultural life of the University community. For many students, involvement in voluntary student groups is not only a traditional part of campus life; it forms a significant component of their learning while at the University.

Many recognized student groups engage in co-curricular activities that enrich the participation of their members in their own academic programs. Involvement in a student group can also provide significant learning opportunities for students with respect to leadership, civic and community engagement, and organizational capacity. Since many student groups address the complex issues of the world around us, engagement in a student group can often provide important opportunities to be exposed to different ideas and perspectives. This helps the University provide meaningful opportunities for debate and dissent, and fosters the development of students' understanding of difference. Finally, participation in student groups provides one means by which students integrate and engage with small communities within the University of Toronto.

During the 2020-2021 academic term, students were faced with the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic which prevented the majority of in person events. Student groups thrive on community building, fun activities, and packed rooms and foyers, which led to a precipitous decrease in the number of student-organized in-person community development opportunities throughout the year. Many groups continued to seek re-recognition, and some existing groups took the challenges of the pandemic, adapted their programming by delivering virtual events, and succeeded in building a virtual community. While the in-person activities were sorely missed, our numbers indicate more than 120 student groups continued to operate, compared to 143 recognized student groups from the previous year.

During the spring of 2020, an updated <u>Policy on the Recognition of Student Groups</u> was introduced. Coordinated by the Office of the Vice-President Students, the policy consultations took place throughout the 2019-2020 academic term, with a final version complete by the end of the term. Below are some highlighted changes within the Policy:

- 1. Each group must provide the names and emails of a minimum of five current University of Toronto students;
- 2. A financial officer cannot be a financial officer for more than one student group;
- 3. Student groups using the University of Toronto name must clearly indicate they are a student group within their group title;
- 4. Relationships with external organizations must be disclosed within the application for recognition;
- 5. A clearly articulated and outlined complaint process for hearing and processing student group complaints;

Groups who did not meet the minimum requirements set within the revised policy were contacted, and all student groups complied with the requested changes.

In accordance with the University's <u>Policy on the Recognition of Student Groups</u>, this is a report on administrative decisions to grant, deny, or withdraw recognition for groups based on University of Toronto Mississauga campus in this academic year. The student groups listed below have been granted recognition until September 30, 2021. All groups that have been granted recognition for the 2020-2021 academic year are listed in this memorandum.

Recognition of student groups by the University provides several benefits and opportunities:

- 1. the right to use the name of the University in the name of the group and in conjunction with group activities;
- 2. eligibility to use University facilities and meeting spaces at no cost or at a lower cost compared to external organizations;
- 3. eligibility to apply for temporary office space;
- 4. listings in select University directories as a University-recognized student group;
- 5. verification letters confirming recognition status (sometimes required by banks and other external organizations);
- 6. access to other University services and resources made available from time to time
- 7. Access to funding through the Ian Orchard Student Initiatives Fund and the Ulife Student Initiatives Funds;
- 8. Support for the preparation and submission of COVID-19 General Assessment Tools (GAT), Event Assessment Tools (EAT) and Student Society Assessment Acknowledgement Tool (SAT), and;
- 9. Eligibility to apply for student group awards.

A student group seeking recognition must submit an annual application to the Centre for Student Engagement along with a copy of the group's constitution. The constitution outlines the group's purpose, objectives, and procedures. It addresses organizational structure, membership, meetings, the election or appointment of members in leadership positions, amendments to the constitution, and rules of conduct. A commitment to democracy and accountability to members should also be reflected.

Full membership in a recognized student group (including eligibility to vote and serve in a leadership position) must be open to any currently registered University of Toronto student from any division. While discriminatory membership practices are not allowed, it is acknowledged that certain groups could well be homogeneous in nature without being discriminatory. Status as non-voting members

may be extended to other University community members or interested persons from outside the University.

Groups seeking recognition by the University must be genuine student groups and generally non-profit in nature. A recognized student group cannot be controlled by any external body. However, many groups are affiliated with provincial, national, or international bodies and other external organizations.

Under the terms of the *Policy*, the University will not attempt to censor, control or interfere with any group on the basis of its philosophy, beliefs, interests or opinions expressed unless and until these lead to activities which are illegal or which infringe the rights and freedoms of others within the community. By the same token, recognition as a student group implies neither endorsement of a group's beliefs or philosophy, nor the assumption of legal liability for the group's activities. Please note that pursuant to the *Policy*, the recognition of student groups which draw their membership from only one academic division is delegated to the governance body of that division.

It is important to note that there are hundreds of additional clubs, many athletics and recreation activities, Hart House clubs and committees, as well as recognized student groups based on other campuses which, while not listed here, add significantly to the educational, intellectual, recreational, social, and cultural life of the U of T community. In addition, many students are involved in student governments, college and faculty student societies, course unions, and departmental student associations.

Recognition Granted
