Description of Proposed Changes:

Rearranging the program requirements to list courses in sequence (B-levels followed by C-levels, followed by D-levels) Changed the code, and title changes Edited the list of elective courses within the program Added VPSB01H3 (new course) as a program requirement; and VPSB02H3 in the program elective requirement. Reduced the VPH course requirements, and added VPSC-level requirements to help complete degree requirements.

Rationale

Language and organization modified to make requirements clearer for students.

Changes have been made to Theory and Practice courses. These courses were created many years ago, and needed a revision to better align with the expertise of the new hires Studio Art has made in the past few years.

VPSB56H3 is removed as a core requirement and has been added to a list of elective courses to better manage enrolments, and avoid creating bottlenecks. VPSB01H3 The Artist added to give Majors more discipline-specific historical and theoretical learning

D-level requirements are now specific courses to provide students with focused curriculum for preparation for graduate study

CRTB02H3: Exhibiting Art

New Course Code: VPHB40H3

Description:

A critical look at ways of exhibiting art, from a variety of international, historical and contemporary perspectives with emphasis on today's displays in public and private institutions, and on beyond the gallery installation, performance, and virtual art practices.

This course offers a critical look at ways of exhibiting art, including exploring the exhibitions and collection of the Doris McCarthy Gallery and the public sculptures located on campus. Through readings, discussions and site visits we will consider the nature of exhibitions, their audiences and current practices juxtaposed with investigations of the history and practice of display.

Exclusions:

VPSB73H3, (VPHB71H3), FAH310H

Methods of Assessment:

Methods of assessment will include short writing assignments to analyze diverse modes of display, as well as a set of scaffolded writing and oral presentation assignments that synthesize learning of various stages of exhibition development into a semester-long project.

Learning Outcomes:

Students will explore and understand the roles of exhibitions, interventions, and texts in diverse communities, within a globalized world. Students will build awareness of creative cultural practice and diverse communication strategies through the study of and writing about media, materials and techniques, research methodologies, cultural theory, critical analysis of art and social relationships, and in the organization of exhibitions, interventions and on-line projects. They will become familiar with current trends in practice, theories, and criticism, and will study the artistic production of historical and diverse cultures of the modern and contemporary world.

Rationale:

This course code is being changed as the Curatorial Studies Minor program has been closed; this course, initially coded CRTB02H3, is being re-allocated to the Art History and Visual Culture program and is being re-coded accordingly.

The closing of the Curatorial Studies Minor has created a need in the art history and visual culture program for a course that addresses the increasingly significant role of exhibition and display in today's art world. The proposed modification will help student learns about the important and symbiotic relationship of art-world institutions and academic programs of study, particularly since these relationships are the site of important challenges and rapid changes confronting long-standing concerns around equity, race, diversity, gender, decolonization of collections, and other areas of inclusion.

In addition, this course will connect students with the exhibitions and events of the campus art gallery, the Doris McCarthy Gallery. There is no other course at UTSC that either offers study in this area and utilizes the resources of the Doris McCarthy Gallery to introduce students to issues and ideas of exhibiting art and visual culture, particularly on campus, and to explore the opportunities this resource provides to a range of audiences and communities.

VPSC69H3: Theory and Practice: Art and Globalization

New Course Code: VPSC90H3

Description:

This course will focus on the influence of global visual culture on contemporary art practices; exploring how artists respond to orientalism, colonial histories, migration, media, tourism, and the international art world. The culturally diverse backgrounds of students and their understanding of global media will be starting points for studio projects.

This open-media studio-seminar will examine the relationship between contemporary art and globalizing and decolonizing forces, focusing on key topics such as migration, diaspora, colonialism, indigeneity, nationalism, borders, language, translation, and global systems of trade, media, and cultural production. Students will explore current art practices shaped by globalization and will conceive, research, and develop art projects that draw from their experiences of a globalizing world.

Prerequisites:

2.5 credits at VPSB level the B- or C-level in VPS courses; students enrolled in the Specialist and Major programs in Studio Art must also complete VPHA46H3

Methods of Assessment

Artwork assignments involving research and work-in-progress critiques Writing assignments related to course content

Learning Outcomes:

Students will gain a deeper understanding of critical concepts, debates, and artistic methodologies relevant to the course subject matter. Students will develop the ability to manage creative projects from concept development through to completion or public presentation. Students will develop a familiarity and comfort with experimentation as a mode of creative inquiry. Students will gain an understanding of artistic methods including but not limited to conceptual, formal, site-specific, collaborative, and interdisciplinary approaches to artmaking. Develop effective and accessible visual, written, and oral communication skills relevant to the discipline. Students will gain a respect for diverse perspectives, by developing a knowledge of how contemporary art practices are shaped by cultural and geographic contexts and through intersections of gender, race, and ethnicity.

Rationale:

Code change allows the course to be listed in the Calendar alongside other Theory and Practice courses.

Name change helps students to identify this course as a C-level option within the suite of Theory and Practice courses offered in the program.

Description re-written to update language pertaining to subject matter. This description has remained the same for over a decade whereas the subject of "Globalization" has been developing. Hence this description was revised in content to reflect more current issues. Course learning outcomes have not changed.

VPSC79H3: Theory and Practice: Art and Social Justice

New Course Code: VPSC95H3

Title:

Theory and Practice: Art and Activism Social Justice

Description:

This course will explore contemporary artistic practices that blur the boundary between art and activism.

We will examine how artists address political issues and the techniques they use to reach different types of audiences. Students will do research and develop projects that address specific local issues and wider social concerns.

This open-media studio-seminar will explore contemporary art practices that are invested in the relationship between art, activism, and social change. Students will examine how artists address social, economic, environmental, and political issues and the techniques they use to engage different types of collaborators and audiences. Students will conceive, research and develop collaborative art projects that address current social issues on a local or global scale. This course will place a strong emphasis collaborative work and community engagement.

Exclusions:

VPSC79H3, VIS307H, VIS310H

Rationale:

Code change allows the course to be listed in the Calendar alongside other Theory and Practice courses.

Minor modification to make course title and description more accessible to students to better align it with course content. Change also conforms to naming convention for program C-level courses. To further clarify, students did not readily understand the meaning of the word "Activism". They were further deterred from taking the course as they understood this meant that their work must include a public act of activism. By changing to the term "Social Justice", we are signaling to students that there is a much broader scope to activism, and hence this new title is a better reflection of the course content without altering the course learning outcome.

VPSC70H3: Interdisciplinary Digital Art

Title:

Theory and Practice: New Media in Studio Interdisciplinary Digital Art

Description:

Information technologies are radically and rapidly transforming our culture. Networking, robotics, GPS, ubiquitous computing, data mining, rfid, biotech, surveillance, sound installation, digital image processing and interactive display are all offering new opportunities for the artist as well as new critical issues to address. Students will create affordable projects that address these issues.

This course will extend digital art practice into a range of other Studio Art media, allowing students to explore the creation of hybrid works that fuse traditional mediums with new technologies. Students will have the opportunity to work on projects that utilize networking, kinetics, GPS, data mining, sound installation, the Internet of Things (IoT), and interactivity.

Rationale:

The course content and learning outcomes have not changed. We are requesting a minor modification to make the course title and description more accessible to students. This course title change results in a more accurate description of the course content and reflects current terminology in the field. The term "Digital Art" aligns with the medium-specific courses offered at the B-level.

Additionally, this title change now conforms to naming convention for other C-level courses within the program.

HLTB15H3: Introduction to Health Research Methodology

Description:

New:

The objective of this course is to introduce students to the main principles that are needed to undertake health-related research. Students will be introduced to the concepts and approaches to health research, the nature of scientific inquiry, the role of empirical research, and epidemiological research designs.

The Department of Health and Society seeks to remove the statistics pre-requisite from HLTB15H3.

Currently, the way that the course content is approached, statistics is not required for students to be able to understand the material that is being conveyed. Students are being taught about principles and methodologies surrounding health research as opposed to numerical literacy and data synthetization, making the STA requirement unnecessary. This will also allow for easier sequencing for students between their STA requirement and this course.
