- Lived-experience consultations offered by Facilities & Services under the Accessibility Improvement Program



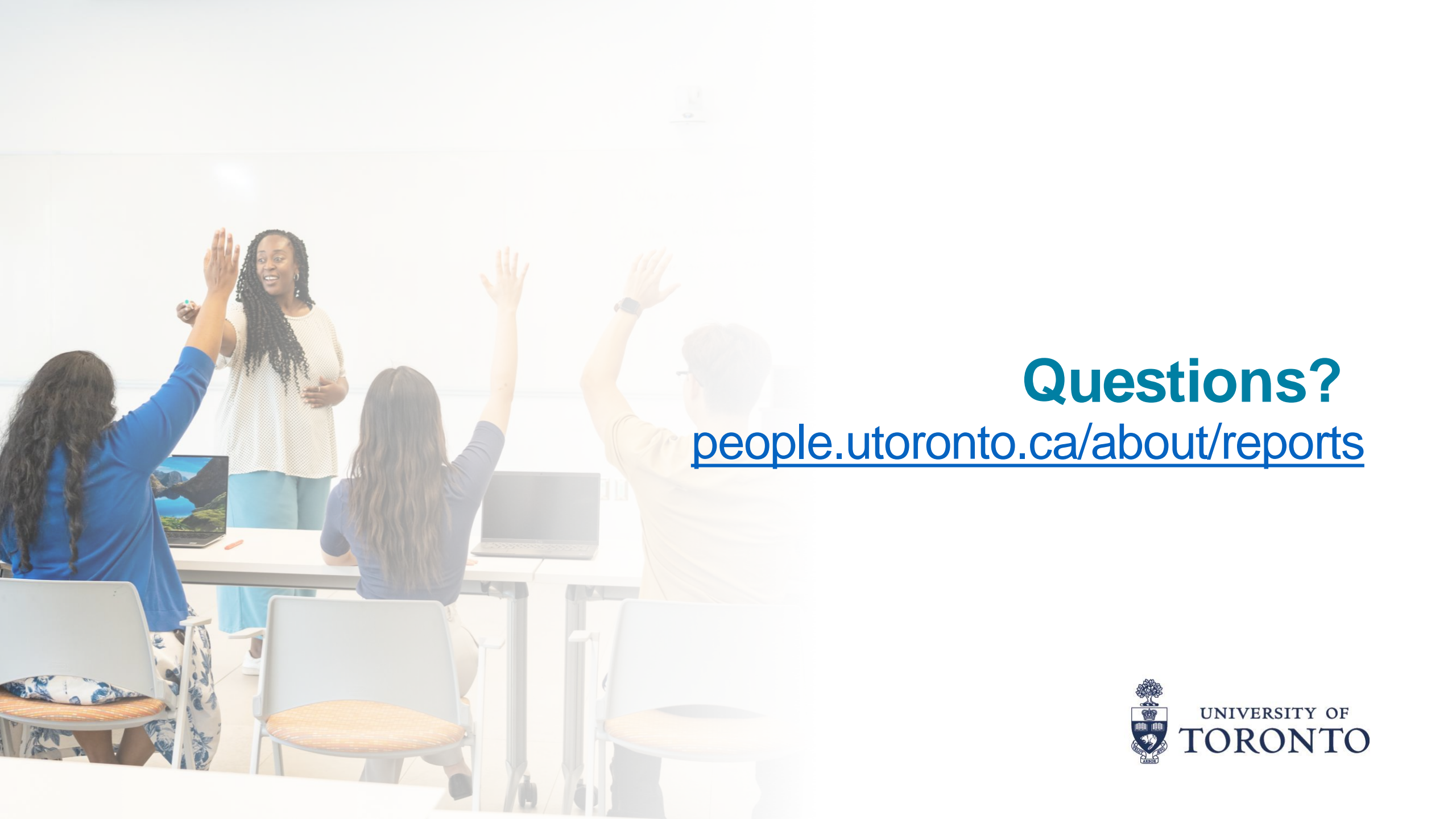
