At its hearing on April 18, 1994, the University Tribunal considered the following charges against you:

THAT on November 17, 1993 you did represent as your own, an idea or expression of an idea or a work of another in connection with a term test or other form of academic work, namely Lab Assignment #3 in GGR 117Y;

THAT on November 17, 1993, you did use or possess an unauthorized aid or aids or obtain unauthorized assistance in a term test or in connection with any other form of academic work, in that you did use the work of Mr. H in preparing Assignment #3 in GGR 117Y;

THAT on December 1, 1993, you did represent as your own an idea or expression of an idea or work of another in a term test or in another form of academic work namely, Lab Assignment #4 in GGR 117Y; and

THAT on December 1, 1993 you did use or possess an unauthorized aid or aids or obtain unauthorized assistance in a term test or in connection with any other form of academic work, in that you did use the work of Mr. $H_{.}$ in preparing Lab Assignment #4 in GGR 117Y.

In particular, on November 17, 1993, you submitted Lab Assignment #3, and on December 1, 1993 Lab Assignment #4, both assignments having been copied in whole or in part from another student.

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After you had pled guilty to the first and third charges, the University withdrew the remaining charges. The jury unanimously agreed to impose the following sanctions:

- a grade of '0' in GGR 117Y;
- suspension from the University for a period of two years;

and that:

- notation of the sanction and the reasons for it to be recorded on your transcript for a period of five years; and
- that the decision and the sanctions imposed be reported to the Provost for publication in the University newspapers.

The jury gave the following reasons for its decision: "We found the arguments of the University's representative compelling. In particular, since this was not Mr. 1.5 first conviction under the Code, we felt that without a severe sanction, the likelihood of a repeat offence would be significant. In addition, we felt that Mr. 1. would benefit from a period of reflection and reassessment of his academic interests."

Information concerning rights of appeal may be found in Section C.III of the <u>Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters</u>. The deadline for filing an appeal by you or by the University is May 17, 1994.
